8 Step to Better IEP Meetings: Play Hearts, Not Poker

Have a peer edit the IEP. Everyone makes mistakes and it's better to catch them pre-meeting. Send home a parent survey, and give the parents a call or email to discuss what will be talked about during the upcoming meeting. Avoid talking about placement prior to the actual IEP meeting though.
