Fetal-Maternal Hemorrhage: A Case and Literature Review

Fetomaternal hemorrhage (FMH) aka maternofetal hemorrhage or fetomaternal transfusion refers to the entry of fetal blood into the maternal circulation before or during delivery that can lead to neonatal anemia.

Case Report of Anemia Following Fetal-Maternal Hemorrhage

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Massive fetomaternal hemorrhage (FMH) can cause devastating pregnancy outcomes. Perinatal prognosis may be improved by intrauterine transfusion, but the appropriate management for these pregnancies remains unclear.

The Recurrence Risk of Fetomaternal Hemorrhage

Causes of fetal-maternal hemorrhage
Fetal-maternal hemorrhages can be the result of trauma to the placenta or surrounding areas, or they can be completely spontaneous. Trauma-related hemorrhages may result from poorly administered invasive tests such as amniocentesis and chorionic villus biopsies.

Bleeding During Pregnancy and Birth: Risks to the Baby

In some cases, the hemorrhage is large enough to compromise the fetus, resulting in fetal demise, stillbirth, or delivery of a severely anemic infant. Unfortunately, the symptoms of a significant fetal-maternal hemorrhage can be subtle, nonspecific, and difficult to identify at the time of the event.

Fetal-maternal haemorrhage. Specialty. Obstetrics. Normally the maternal circulation and the fetal circulation are kept from direct contact with each other,

with gas and nutrient exchange taking place across a membrane in the placenta made of two layers, the syncytiotrophoblast and the cytotrophoblast. Fetal-maternal haemorrhage occurs when this membrane ceases to function as a barrier and fetal cells may come in contact with and enter the maternal vessels in the decidua/endometrium.

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Rosette test for Rh factor The Rosette test is performed on postpartum maternal blood to estimate the volume of fetal-maternal hemorrhage in case of an Rh negative mother and an Rh positive child. This estimate, in turn, also estimates the required amount of Rho (D) immune globulin to administer.

This case was a transported late preterm neonate who presented initially with persistent hypoxia unresponsive to usual respiratory support. On examination, mild paleness was noted. Primary Diagnosis: Anemia caused by fetal-maternal hemorrhage was the ultimate diagnosis confirmed by a Kleihauer-Betke test on maternal serum examining fetal cells.

Fetal/neonatal alloimmune thrombocytopenia (FNAIT) is caused by the transplacental passage of maternal immunoglobulin G immune globulins, which subsequently cause destruction of fetal platelets. ⁸ It is most commonly caused by maternal-fetal incompatibility in the HPA-1a platelet antigen, with up to 25% of

babies with this HPA mismatch affected. 8 The usual presentation is intracranial hemorrhage in the fetus or the neonate. 8 FNAIT has been reported as the likely cause of fetal anemia (61 ...

Fetal-maternal hemorrhage (FMH) is the presence of fetal blood cells in the maternal circulation prior to the time of delivery. Under normal circumstances, maternal and fetal circulations are kept separate from direct exchange by the placental membrane composed of syncytiotrophoblasts and cytotrophoblasts . Gaseous and micronutrient exchange freely occurs at this interphase.

Fetal Maternal Hemorrhage A Case

During childbirth, 3% to 5% of women experience maternal hemorrhage, the leading cause of maternal death around the world. In 2010, the California Maternal Quality Care Collaborative (CMQCC) released its first Hemorrhage Toolkit aimed at reducing maternal morbidity and death.

Fetal and neonatal alloimmune thrombocytopenia (FNAIT) is the most common cause of intracranial haemorrhage (ICH) in relation to thrombocytopenia in term-born infants. 1 FNAIT is caused by maternal alloantibodies directed against fetal platelets due to incompatibility in human platelet antigens (HPAs).

This is most commonly a silent process in which a woman with a seemingly normal pregnancy does not experience symptoms related to the transfer of fetal blood.[1]

In prenatal maternal trauma, there can also be a fetal bleed. Much as in childbirth, in a trauma, the baby's blood can enter the mother's circulation. This indicates placental hemorrhage and can be a prediction of preterm labor.
